The Department [proposed a regulatory amendment](#) to create a new, single “Coordinator of Work-Based Learning Programs” extension that would replace the following two current extensions: “Coordinator of Work-Based Learning Programs for Career Awareness” extension and “Coordinator of Work-Based Learning Programs for Career Development” extension. The proposed extension would enable educators to coordinate a wider range of work-based learning programs. The certification requirements for the proposed extension will be the same as the base certificate, coursework, and experience requirements for the current “Coordinator of Work-Based Learning Programs for Career Awareness” extension, with some minor revisions. The registration requirements for programs leading to a coordinator of work-based learning programs extension would continue to be at least six semester hours of coursework in developing, implementing, coordinating, and evaluating work-based learning experiences and programs. The proposal will not require institutions that have registered programs leading to this type of extension to revise their programs.
