Things every parent should know about student participation in statewide assessments under the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA)



The Every Student Succeeds Act outlines how states can use federal money to support public school New York receives \$1.6 billion in federal funding each year to support its public schools.

What are the statewide assessment participation requirements under ESSA?

ESSA requires thetverystate assessall students in English languagerts and matheach year in grades 3-& and at least once in high school While New York State does not not any laws regarding arent rights to choose whether their children participate instate testing, federal law requires that:

- States must ensure that5% of students in each public school, including charter school trace yearly in required state assessments.
 - o This applies to all student subgroups, which include racial/ethnic groups, Enzylishage Learners Multilingual Learners low-income students, and students with disabilities
- If requested, **s**hool districts and charter schoolare required toprovide parentswith information on state or local policies regarding the rights of parents to choose not have their children participate in state testing.
- States are not required toreate or change any laws they have in place regarding parental renceon participation in assessments.

What happens o my childif I advise the school that I prefer that my child not participate

There are no consequences a child who does not participate in a state assessmetwever, sate assessment results are used to help:

- Parentslearn about their academic achievement;
- Teachersunderstand how well students are learning what is being taught
- School district, and state education leaders determine what is and is not working aveil
- Stakeholdersidentify achievement gapts at may be forming among different student populations



When too few students participate completestate assessments, recognizegaps and provide] §] support to the students who need it the most. Students who do not do well on a state assessment, or who are not on track to be come proficient in ELA, math, science, and/social studies can qualify for] §] } instructional support, guidance counseling, attendance improvement services, and help with study skills.
